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Brief Program Description and Goals

Heritage Community College's Health Care Assistant program prepares students to be a part of a health-care team in a variety of different settings, providing a high level of frontline care to clients in need of assistance. This program focuses on developing the core skills needed to care for clients in the health care field. Topics include personal care, assisting with mobility and feeding needs, communication, assisting with medication delivery, and clinical skills.

The Health Care Assistant program will prepare students to work in a variety of health-related work environments. Graduates of our Health Care Aide program can work in a variety of health care environments such as: acute care hospitals, long-term care facilities, group homes, assisted living facilities and in the community providing home care.

HCAs assist with promoting and maintaining the health, safety, independence, comfort, and well-being of their clients and their families. HCAs provide personal care assistance and services in a caring manner that recognizes and supports the unique care needs, abilities, and backgrounds of clients and their families. They work as members of a health care interdisciplinary team in a variety of settings with direction and supervision from regulated health care professionals. This program prepares students to meet these objectives.

The BC Care Aide & Community Health Worker Registry reviews and recognizes Health Care Assistant (HCA) programs in B.C. to ensure that they are following the provincial curriculum, implementing a common set of training standards and graduating competent front-line health care providers. Confirming that HCAs meet registration requirements is integral to the Registry's mandate of patient protection and improved standards of care.

Upon successful completion of the Health Care Assistant Program, under the supervision of a nurse, the graduate will show evidence of a beginning ability to:

HCA Program Objectives

- Provide person---centred care and assistance that recognizes and respects the uniqueness of each individual client.
- Use an informed problem---solving approach to provide care and assistance that promotes the physical, psychological, social, cognitive and spiritual well---being of clients and families.
- Provide care and assistance for clients experiencing complex health challenges.
- Provide care and assistance for clients experiencing cognitive and/or mental health challenges.
- Interact with other members of the health care team in ways that contribute to effective working relationships and the achievement of goals.
- Communicate clearly, accurately and in sensitive ways with clients and families within a variety of community and facility contexts.
- Provide personal care and assistance in a safe, competent and organized manner.
- Recognize and respond to own self---development, learning and health enhancement needs.
- Perform the care provider role in a reflective, responsible, accountable and professional manner

Students must meet all of the admissions requirements as listed below.

Admission Requirements

- B.C. secondary school graduation or equivalent, or or mature student status 19 years of age
- Criminal record check (in accordance with the Criminal Records Review Act)

English Requirements:

English as First Language Speakers

- Evidence of one of the following: Proof of completion of Grade 10 English; or
- College courses determined to be equivalent to completion of Grade 10 English (or higher) by postsecondary institutions. Applicants must produce transcripts as evidence of completion. A minimum of a C grade is acceptable.
- Canadian Adult Achievement Test (CAAT): Reading Comprehension 35/50, Spelling 23/32
- Language Placement Index (LPI): The three individual scores (Sentence Structure, English Usage, and Reading Comprehension) must total a minimum of 20, out of a maximum possible score of 40. Essay level of 4, with a minimum essay score of 24/40
- Accuplacer: Grade 10 level or higher Cut Scores*: Reading Comprehension 60, Sentences Skill 55, Writeplacer 4

English as Second Language Speakers

**Either of the following assessments must have been completed within the last two years or last year:

- Evidence of one of the following test scores: 1. The Test
 of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL): test must be
 within the last two years, IBT only -- Overall score of 76
 with no score lower than 20 in Speaking and Listening
 and no score lower than 18 in Reading and Writing
- International English Language Testing System (IELTS):
 Academic or General -- test must be within the last two years: Overall score of 6 with a minimum of 6 in Speaking and Listening and no score lower than 5.5 in Reading and Writing
- Canadian Language Benchmark Placement Test (CLB PT): test must be within the last year: Listening 7, Speaking 7, Reading 6 and Writing 6 - Note: a CLB Report Card from a LINC Program may also be accepted.

- Canadian English Language Proficiency Index Program (CELPIP): Academic or General -- Academic: Aggregate score of 4L or better, with 4L or better in Speaking and Listening and 3H or better in Reading and Writing.
 General: CELPIP 7 or better in Speaking and Listening and CELPIP 6 in Reading and Writing
- Canadian Academic English Language Assessment (CAEL):
 Overall Score of 60, with no section less than 50 Passing

Pre-Practice Experience Requirements:

- A clear criminal record check (Criminal Record Review Program)
- Immunizations as per Practice Education Guidelines
 - Provide proof of a negative reaction to a TB skin test <u>or</u> a chest x-ray with a note from a physician stating that you are not contagious.
 - A note from a physician stating that you are mentally and physically able to perform duties normally associated with your chosen field.
 - It is strongly recommended that student immunizations remain current for Hepatitis B., Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Tetanus, Polio and Diphtheria.
 - Minimum two doses of the Covid-19 Vaccine
- Completion of Student Practice Education Core Orientation modules
- Completion of First Aid and CPR 'C' Certification
- Completion of Food Safe
- Completion of Workplace Violence Prevention Modules
- Completion of Student Practice Education Core Orientation Modules (SPECO)
- Successful completion of all theoretical courses with a minimum 70% grade in each course
- Successful demonstration of skills testing in preparation for practice experiences

Method(s) of Evaluation

Evaluation of the students will be based on:

- Class participation (Group Discussion & Attendance)
- Projects: reports, presentations
- Quizzes and Assignments
- Final examination
- Lab Skills Competency Assessment
- Practicum assessment

Attendance Expectation: The FT students are required to attend the classes regularly from Monday to Friday for 5 hours a day and 25 hours a week for 20 weeks. The PT students are expected to attend on the weekends, for 6 hours each on Saturday and Sunday over 42 weeks.

Completion Requirements

An overall average of 70% is required for the successful completion of all courses. Standard CPR (Level C), First Aid, FoodSafe, Health Authority required Student Practice Education Core Orientation and the Provincial Violence Prevention Modules will be completed during the program.

FT Instructional and Lab Application hours & weeks:

535 hours over 21 weeks.

There are 40 hours of external training in the program. Practicum hours & weeks: 290 hours over 8 weeks PT Instructional and Lab Application hours (SAT/SUN)

12 hours week over 46 weeks. There are 25 hours dedicated towards job preparation at the end of the program. See the
